



Next Steps: Follow Up after Screening

1. Provide Opportunities for Learning and Practice

- The ages of birth through 5 years are critical times in your young child's brain development and a great time to support early learning.
- Review the items on the ASQ to see the types of things children can do at this age. Your results letter may also give you ideas of areas your child may need more practice.
- Have fun using the Play Activities and Learning Activities ideas with your child to continue to introduce and build skills in play and daily routines.

2. Share Completed Questionnaires and Results With Your Health & Childcare Providers

- These professionals can help review results and decide next steps together.

3. Monitor your child's development

Concerned About Your Child's Development or Behavior?

What is Early Intervention? Early Intervention provides free developmental services to eligible children, ages birth to five years, and their families. Services may include home visits with a developmental specialist, or services such as speech therapy.
