Learning and Practice

1. Review your responses to the items to get an idea of skills that may be emerging or skills that may need extra practice at home.
2. To encourage your child's progress, use the items in the ASQ as guides for what is expected at this time, what is "typical" development at this age.
3. Have fun using the Learning Activities ideas (see Learning Activities link in your Results Reply email) with your child to help introduce and build skills in play and daily routine. The ages of birth through 5 years are critical times in your young child's brain development and a great time to support early learning.
4. Begin with the easy activities, introducing new ones as your child gains confidence and ability. Some activities may be too easy, some too difficult, as they cover a wide age range. (See more Parent Information links, below.)

Monitor your child's development

1. You are welcome to return to this site and check on your child's development at any time. [ASQ Oregon Child Development Checklist](#)
2. If your child's development is on schedule, every 4-6 months would be appropriate.
3. If you have concerns, you could check in earlier, in the next 1 to 3 months.

Share the ASQ Results with your child's pediatrician

Your pediatrician is an important person to talk to about your child's development.

1. Bring your child's completed ASQ and the results reply email to your pediatrician to help in a conversation about your child's development.
2. Many pediatricians and physicians are using the ASQ in well-child checkups. If you have concerns, your pediatrician may be able to provide more information or help alleviate your concerns. More information on the ASQ and ASQ:SE is available at the information site: agesandstages.com



About Early Intervention services in Oregon..If You Have Concerns

1. If you have concerns now or in the future, contact your local child development "Early Intervention" program. There are free, Early Intervention programs in every community serving families with children birth to 5 years.
2. A parent or caregiver can call the local Early Intervention program to talk with a development specialist or to request a free development checkup. You do not need a professional referral.
3. Free developmental support services such as physical, speech or occupational therapies are available for children ages birth to 5 years.
4. Early Intervention providers recognize that very young children may have slower than expected development in one or more areas for a variety of reasons. They are available to help families encourage/support a child's development.
